FREE SPEECH, FREE PRESS, FREE SOCIETY LAW DAY - 2019 By Gregory S. Hagopian, Esq.



This year's Law Day theme, according to the American Bar Association (ABA), is Free Speech, Free Press, Free Society. The First Amendment text reads: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances." Recently, instead of hearing people give reverence to these fundamental rights, the concept of free speech and freedom of the press is often attacked, and even mocked.

Certainly, reasonable minds can differ as to the accuracy of a news report, credibility of a reporter, or bias of a network. However, "fake news" is the all too often rallying cry, used as a crutch by many when they disagree with what is being said. It is a leap to suggest that said reporters and/or networks should be completely silenced and, in some cases, even persecuted. To quote the ABA again, "In the United States and around the world, freedom of speech and the press are among the most important foundations for a free society. Free speech and free press are prominent topics in public discourse and litigation. It is impossible to imagine a free society without these individual liberties, yet historical and current debates surrounding them continually challenge us to consider their boundaries and resilience. Changes in technology have reshaped how free speech and free press work in the everyday world." Long gone are the days where protestors gathered at the courthouse steps to criticize the government and the audience was merely those within earshot. Now the entire world is a reporter or protestor's audience, thanks to smartphones and social media which can provide the author with millions of views almost instantly.

The First Amendment ensures that a person electing to kneel while the national anthem is being played at a sporting event has a Constitutional right to do so. We may find it disrespectful, offensive, and un-patriotic, but the Constitution explicitly recognizes a citizen's right to do just that. We currently have evening television "news" networks whose evening "newscasts" are nearly 100 percent politically opinion driven. They are often openly hostile towards our elected leaders and members of Congress. Which channel you choose to watch while channel surfing will dictate what political party is on the receiving end of that station's "vitriol." That is, of course, the price we pay for our Freedom of Speech. As unpleasant and uncivil as it may have become, the alternative is unthinkable. A look at the world around us illustrates the dangers inherent in restricting the rights of peaceful protest, free speech, and independent press.

Pursuant to Article I, Section 16(b)(5) of the Florida Constitution, certain information and records on the Manatee County Clerk of Court's website are being protected based upon the victim's request to prevent the disclosure of information or records that could be used to locate or harass the victim or the victim's family or which could disclose confidential or privileged information of the victim. If you are viewing a case where a victim has requested the protections in Article I, Section 16(b)(5), you will see a prominent notice at or near the top of the electronic docket page, and the information and records in that case may not be immediately available. To view a document or record that is protected by Article I, Section 16(b)(5), please use the Viewable on Request (VOR) process. If you have any difficulties with the VOR process, please contact the Clerk's Service Desk at (941) 742-5855. If you have questions about access to court records, please contact Matt Whyte, General Counsel, at (941) 749-1800.





2012 in Russia: three members of the Russian female punk rock band Pussy Riot were arrested and sentenced to two years in prison for performing a song critical of President Vladimir Putin. They sang the so-called "offensive" lyrics deemed to be "hooliganism" while performing in Moscow's famed Christ Savior Cathedral. The alleged lyrics: "Mother Mary, please drive Putin away." [Laura Smith-Spark, CNN.] Imagine if United States musicians were imprisoned when they sang a lyric remotely critical of the government.

2018 in Turkey: police detained and arrested three activists, who carried signs that read "Recognize the Armenian Genocide, apologize and compensate," and barred the demonstrators from making a statement to the press that contained the terms "genocide" and "massacres" at a memorial event on April 24, the date in 1915 that is considered the start of the Armenian genocide and when commemorations are held worldwide. [Ayla Jean Yackley, Lobe Log.] Imagine if student demonstrators or protestors were arrested because they carried a sign with a message that the U.S. government took issue with.

Perhaps the most egregious and highly publicized example of oppression of free speech is that of Jamal Khashoggi. Mr. Khashoggi was a prominent Saudi journalist and former adviser to the Saudi royal family. He fell out of favor with the royal family and went into self-imposed exile in the United States. He began writing a monthly column for the Washington Post and appearing on various television news outlets, where he was openly critical of the Saudi government and the royal family. Eventually, he was summoned to the Saudi embassy in Istanbul, Turkey on October 2, 2018 where he was tortured and murdered. The sole motive for his murder: he was a reporter critical of the government. According to a December 4, 2018 New York Times report, "a bipartisan group of senior senators stated that a classified briefing by the C.I.A. director had only solidified their belief that Mohammed bin Salman, the crown prince of Saudi Arabia, ordered the killing of the Saudi dissident Jamal Khashoggi." Imagine if every reporter critical of the U.S. government was kidnapped, tortured, and murdered.

The foregoing are just a few recent examples of crackdowns on freedom of speech and freedom of the press in other countries. But they illustrate the ongoing worldwide concerns.

According to a December 13, 2018 article and report by Elana Beiser of the Committee to Protect Journalists:

Fresh waves of repression in China, Egypt, and Saudi Arabia sustained the global crackdown on press freedom in 2018 for the third consecutive year. In its annual global survey, the Committee to Protect Journalists found at least 251 journalists in jail in relation to their work, as Turkey--still the world's worst jailer of journalists--released a small number.

The past three years have recorded the highest number of jailed journalists since CPJ began keeping track, with consecutive records set in 2016 and 2017. Turkey, China, and Egypt were responsible for more than half of those jailed around the world for the third year in a row.

The majority of those imprisoned globally--70 percent-are facing anti-state charges such as belonging to or aiding groups deemed by authorities as terrorist organizations. The number imprisoned on charges of false news rose to 28 globally, compared with 9 just two years ago. Egypt jailed the most journalists on <u>false news charges</u> with 19, followed by Cameroon with 4, Rwanda with 3, and one each in China and Morocco. The increase comes amid heightened global rhetoric about "<u>fake news</u>," of which U.S. President Donald Trump is the leading voice.

The higher number of prisoners in China--with 47 behind bars--reflects the latest wave of persecution of the Uighur ethnic minority in the Xinjiang region. At least 10 journalists in China were detained without charge, all of them in Xinjiang, where the United Nations has accused Beijing of mass surveillance and <u>detention</u> of up to a million people without trial.

As we celebrate Law Day 2019, hopefully we can remember the importance of our First Amendment and the rights it provides for all of us. The ABA aptly refers to these rights as: "cornerstones of representative government" and calls on us to "understand and protect these rights to ensure, as the U.S. Constitution proposes, 'the blessings of liberty for ourselves and our posterity."" It does not matter what political party we belong to, we are all Americans, and our freedom is not something to be taken for granted. We, especially as lawyers and active members of our local bar association, should be mindful to take an active role in promoting and praising the First Amendment and all it stands for. The Manatee County Bar has been pro-active in this regard by speaking to elementary and middle school students about Civics and the Constitution. I encourage you to join our efforts to inform and enlighten today's youth. The need to protect the rights of, and promote the education of, upcoming generations is critical to the preservation of the fundamental tenets of the Constitution.

This year on Law Day, the MCBA celebrates a historic event for our Association. For the first time in our history, we can come together to celebrate having a United States Congressman and Florida State Representative from within our membership! We are delighted to have United States Congressman Greg Steube and Florida State Representative Will Robinson as our speakers at our Law Day luncheon where they will discuss their experiences as freshman in their respective offices. We look forward to hearing from them and hope you can join us for Law Day on May 29, 2019.





The TCA reports directly to the Chief Judge of the Twelfth Judicial Circuit but is responsible to all the judges in the circuit. The essential function of the position is to direct and manage operations, programs and services within the circuit. The TCA is responsible for staff supervision, strategic planning, developing and implementing policies and procedures, developing and administering budgets, managing court facilities, and other related administrative functions in support of the judiciary.

Examples of work performed:

- In conjunction with the Chief Judge, directs all administrative functions of the Twelfth Circuit Court. The Trial Court Administrator is a leadership position in this circuit and, as such, develops and maintains relationships with various agencies and entities.
- Directs court programs and services, ensuring compliance with applicable policies, procedures, regulations and statutes.
- Supervises staff, including establishing staffing standards, organizing, selecting or recommending selection, training, assigning and evaluating work, counseling, disciplining and terminating; prepares periodic employee evaluations.
- Develops policies and procedures in consultation with senior management to ensure efficient and economical organizational operations; evaluates results to ensure compliance with regulations and to identify deficiencies.
- Collaborates with senior management to develop strategic plans and capital projects; oversees and coordinates implementation of plans to ensure adherence to organizational standards, policy and procedures, and to make adjustments as needed.

- Liaisons with other court-involved agencies, e.g., clerks of court, state attorneys, public defenders, sheriffs, county commissions, bar associations, etc.
- Develops, presents and defends state and county budget requirements; oversees fiscal activity to ensure proper accounting controls and to review and approve expenditures.
- Negotiates and binds the circuit in contracts and oral and written agreements.
- Supervises information technology to ensure provision of useful systems and to increase productivity; oversees website development, maintenance and support.
- Oversees facility management, including facility security, construction and/or reconstruction, and maintenance of facility.
- Manages administrative matters, such as preparing complex reports or correspondence, conducting special studies or research, developing and administering training, or providing for staff technical or professional growth.
- Liaisons with public and private agencies regarding organizational programs and services; supervises communication to promote the judicial branch and coordinates media relations.
- Serves on various commissions or committees as appointed by the Chief Justice (state) or Chief Judge (local).
- Attends and/or conducts staff, board, committee, task force and other professional meetings and conferences to exchange information; attends technical or professional seminars tor conferences to improve professional skills.

Qualifications:

- Bachelor's degree in public, business or judicial administration, law or a closely related field. A juris doctorate or master's degree is preferred.
- Five years of related supervisory experience, including extensive knowledge of the Florida State Courts System.
- The Trial Court Administrator will also have the ability to effectively communicate throughout all levels of the organization orally and in writing, analyze information, recommend appropriate actions, establish and maintain effective working relationships throughout the circuit, including with state and local government agencies.
