# Congratulations To Judge Thomas Gallen Receiving The 2021 Manatee County Distinguished Citizen Award



On January 7, 2021, at a luncheon at the Manatee County fairgrounds, Judge Thomas M. Gallen received the 2021 Distinguished Citizen Award from the Manatee River Fair Association. Judge Gallen received this award for his many contributions to Manatee County and its citizens. He was born and raised in Tampa and graduated from Jesuit High School. Judge Gallen attended the University of Tampa for a semester before enlisting in the United States Army and serving as a paratrooper. He was recruited to join a new unit called Special Forces being formed at Ft. Bragg, North Carolina which later became known as the Green Berets. While in the Army, Judge Gallen was stationed with the 10th Special Airborne Forces in Bad Tolz, Germany. He jumped over 52 times and was awarded the Senior Parachutist Badge. Upon discharge Judge Gallen graduated with his bachelor's degree in business administration from Florida State University. He then decided to study law and graduated with his juris doctorate degree from the University of Florida. In 1960, Judge Gallen began his legal career in private practice in Bradenton with Jackson Miller. After only a few years practicing law, he was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1965 and then to the Florida Senate in 1972. Judge Gallen continued to

practice law at the same time he served as a legislator. He was also a member of the Manatee County Bar Association where he served as president in 1982.

When Judge Gallen was elected as circuit judge in 1984, he became the first judge to serve the 12th Judicial Circuit after serving in the Florida House of Representative since Judge O.K. Reaves served in 1912 and the first circuit judge to have ever previously served in the Florida Senate. He also served as Chief Judge of the circuit from 1998 through 2002 where he had responsibility for the judges and all court personnel in Manatee, Sarasota and DeSoto counties. Judge Gallen was instrumental in the approval and planning of the Manatee County Judicial Center which opened in 2008. After he retired in 2002, he continued to serve as a senior judge for over 17 years retiring again in 2018. Judge Gallen served for over 30 years as a judge of the 12th Circuit.



Throughout his life Judge Gallen has been involved in the community through his involvement with Bradenton Kiwanis Club and with many other organizations, which would not have been as successful without his involvement. He is the 2nd judge to receive this award with Judge Robert E. Hensley who received the award in 2001.

In 1956, the Manatee River Fair Association in cooperation with the Manatee County Board of Commissioners established the Distinguished Citizen Award to recognize citizens of Manatee County who had distinguished themselves by volunteering their time and making significant and meritorious contributions to Manatee County.

# New Manatee County Judges Continue To Make History

It was just three years ago when all the Manatee County judges were men. You remember those guys. The last five county judges (Judges Brown, Henderson, Farrance, Singer and Sniffen) collectively were on the bench over 100 years. Well, that all changed as they began to retire and young energetic women lawyers were elevated to the county bench one at a time. Judge Renee Inman made history when she was appointed as the first women judge to serve on the county bench since 1982. Then Judge Heather Doyle made history as the second women judge to serve on the county bench. Now with the addition of Judge Jacqueline Steele and Judge Melissa Gould, the county bench is comprised entirely of women. The judiciary and the Manatee County Bar Association welcome both Judge Steele and Judge Gould to the bench.

Judge Steele has been serving as a Manatee County judge since July 1, 2020, after she was appointed by Governor Ron DeSantis. Her appointment brought an attorney with a diversified background to the Manatee County bench. Judge Steele was born and raised in Tampa, Florida where she graduated from Chamberlain High School. She was inspired by her father and high school teacher to become a lawyer. Judge Steele began college at University of South Florida where she graduated with a bachelor's degree in English. Then she pursued her goal to become an attorney and graduated with her juris doctorate degree from Florida State University. Judge Steele began her legal career as an assistant public defender with the 13th Judicial Circuit. She then went into private practice with the firm of McConnaughhay, Coonrod, Pope, Weaver, Stern P. A. After the death of Judge Steele's father, she reevaluated her priorities and felt a strong calling to give back to her community and become a judge. Besides focusing on family and work, she volunteers her time in the community, including with Impact 100 SRQ Women.





Judge Gould will begin her legal career serving as a Manatee County judge on January 4, 2021 after being elected on November 3, 2020. Her election brought also brought an attorney with a diversified background to the Manatee County bench.

Judge Gould was born in Los Angeles, California and raised in a small town in Ontario, Canada. She graduated from Widdifield Secondary School in North Bay. Judge Gould then graduated with her bachelor's degree in sociology from University of Western Ontario and her juris doctorate law degree from City University of New York School of Law. While in school she interned for a judge on the New York State Supreme Court. Later Judge Gould moved to the United Kingdom and graduated with her master of law degree from the University of Cambridge. She moved to Tampa and began her legal career practicing with the firm of Cole, Scott & Kissane handling insurance defense cases. After a year, Judge Gould moved to Michigan and taught family law, constitutional law and judicial process at Oakland University in Rochester. She also volunteered practicing pro-bono work at the University of Michigan Law School's Innocence Clinic, working on cases to help exonerate wrongly convicted prisoners.

Judge Gould became an assistant state attorney for the 12th Judicial Circuit in 2012 where she was practiced until she was elected to the bench. She prosecuted misdemeanor and felony cases before being appointed to a specialty unit handling white collar crime, felony animal abuse cases and crimes against the elderly in Manatee County. Judge Gould is involved in the community and volunteers her time with Meals on Wheels, FIBA (Florida Israel Business Accelerator), SWAT (Successful Women Aligning Together), Isolated Seniors program and Manatee Chamber of Commerce.

For over one hundred and fifteen years, all the judges who served Manatee County were men. Then, more women became lawyers and slowly were elevated to the bench. With the addition of Judges Steele and Gould, the 12th Judicial Circuit now has 17 women judges and 15 men judges. It will be interesting to see if this trend continues.

# SCF Offers Online eDiscovery Course

State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota (SCF), has scheduled an online, 8-week course for legal professionals to explore the effect of electronic information on the litigation practice and the rapidly developing role of software in the areas of legal data, eDiscovery, and information governance. Students will take an in-depth look at the role of software in the litigation lifecycle from data collection and document review to production and presentation at trial. Students will explore project management principles and practices and perform exercises using various software used in the litigation support department and by litigation teams in the acquisition of data and eDiscovery processing. The software exercises will lead to the student becoming certified in eDiscovery by the National Society for Legal Technology who has partnered with the Association of Certified E-Discovery Specialists (ACEDS) in developing the course curriculum.

The online course, which begins Mar. 15 and ends May 6, is facilitated by Vilma Martinez, J.D., faculty of SCF, Tuition for the course is \$307.44 for Florida residents.

### Availability of Bankruptcy Judgeship Positions in the Middle District of Florida at Orlando and Jacksonville

The United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit seeks applications from all highly qualified candidates for a fourteen-year appointment as United States Bankruptcy Judge for the Middle District of Florida. The Court is seeking applications for two positions, one in Orlando\* and one in Jacksonville. The basic jurisdiction of a bankruptcy judge is specified in Title 28, United States Code and explained in Title 11, United States Code, as well as in 98 Stat. 344, Pub. L. 98 353, Title I, §120.

To be qualified for appointment an applicant must -

- (a) Be a member in good standing of the bar of the highest court of at least one state, the District of Columbia, or the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and a member in good standing of every other bar of which the applicant is a member.
- (b) (1) Possess, and have a reputation for, integrity and good character; (2) possess, and have demonstrated, a commitment to equal justice under the law; (3) possess, and have demonstrated, outstanding legal ability and competence; (4) indicate by demeanor, character, and personality that the applicant would exhibit judicial temperament if appointed; and (5) be of sound physical and mental health sufficient to perform the essential duties of the office.
- (c) Not be related by blood or marriage to (1) a judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit; (2) a member of the Judicial Council of the Eleventh Circuit; or (3) a judge of the district court to be served, within the degrees specified in section 458 of Title 28, United States Code, at the time of the initial appointment.
- (d) Have been engaged in the active practice of law for a period of at least five years. The Judicial Council may consider other suitable legal experience as a substitute for the active practice of law.

The selection process will be confidential and competitive. The current annual salary is \$199,088. Persons shall be considered without regard to race, color, sex, gender, gender identity, pregnancy, sexual orientation, religion, national origin, age, or disability. The individual selected must comply with the financial disclosure requirements pursuant to the Ethics in Government Act of 1978, Pub. L. No. 95-521, 92 Stat. 1824 (1978) (codified as amended at 5 U.S.C. app. §§ 101-111).

If you are interested in applying, please submit an original unbound completed application to James P. Gerstenlauer, Circuit Executive, 56 Forsyth Street, NW, Atlanta, Georgia 30303. Application forms are available on the Court's Website at www.call.uscourts.gov. Applications must be submitted only by potential nominees to the Circuit Executive's Office and must be received by **1 February 2021**. Submission of a completed application will be considered verification of willingness to serve if selected. Emailed and faxed copies of applications will not be accepted. **Please include a cover letter indicating whether you wish to be considered for both open positions or for only one position.** If you wish to be considered for both open application is necessary.

<sup>\*</sup> This is a new judgeship in the Middle District of Florida. Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. 152(b)(1), the Eleventh Circuit Judicial Council has recommended to the Judicial Conference of the United States (JCUS) that the official duty station for this judgeship be set as Orlando, Florida. However, a final decision by the JCUS is not expected before March 2021.

# **MCBA Inspiration!** SCF Paralegal Program Graduate Overcomes Obstacles to Meet Goal

When Patricia "Patti" Hogancamp graduated from the State College of Florida (SCF) in December 2020, it was an achievement deserving of special recognition. Patti overcame many barriers, including significant financial and physical limitations, in her continuing pursuit of education. Through the years, she has never let any obstacle stop her from pursuing her dream of earning an associate's degree in Legal Assisting/Paralegal Studies. Not even COVID-19 limitations stopped her from crossing the finish line, albeit in a van during the "drive though graduation ceremony.

Prior to enrolling at SCF, Patti served our country as a nurse in the U.S. Air Force from 1985 through 1990. Afterward she worked as an LPN. She had always been interested in the law and decided to return to school to become trained to work as a paralegal. She faced financial and time constraints to balance work and school, in addition to being a non-traditional student in terms of age. None of this discouraged her or slowed her down.

In 1997, Patti enrolled at SCF. She took one course at a time, having to pay for each without any financial assistance. Patti decided to become a paralegal, with her ultimate goal of being able to be of assistance to attorneys and clients.

I first met Patti during the Spring 2013 semester when I had the pleasure of teaching her in the General Law course. As a student in the SCF program, Patti stood out for her interest in the subject matter, participation in class, and dedication to not only

earning an A in the course, but more importantly, mastering the subject matter. We spoke often about how she could parlay her medical background with a paralegal education to work for a law firm handling personal injury and medical malpractice cases. Nurse paralegals are a vital asset to both plaintiff and defense firms that deal in reviewing and understanding medical records and terminology. I had no doubt that she was on track to become a successful paralegal.

However, later that year her mother had a heart attack. Patti delayed her education for a semester to take care of her. The next year, just as she was ready to return to SCF, Patti suffered a stroke which left her wheelchair bound and with difficulty writing and speaking. She spent the next few years recovering from her stroke. Her fierce determination to earn her degree kept her focused during that difficult time.

In the Fall 2018 semester, despite requiring a wheelchair and having difficulty writing and speaking, Patti returned to SCF with the goal of completing her education. I was excited to have her as a student in the Civil Litigation I course that semester. She required assistance from a note taker, but otherwise persevered and excelled in the course. She participated in class discussions and asked questions despite the constant struggle with being understood by both me and her fellow students. Patti simply never gave up. She earned an A in the course and returned in Spring 2019 for Civil Litigation II, were she also earned an A. And let me be clear, she was graded based on the quality of her work, both written documents, quizzes, and other assignments. While it might have been tempting to grade her work

more leniently, I never considered it. Patti does not want to be treated any differently and her work speaks for itself - she mastered the material and skills.

Patti never missed a class during those two semesters, even though she had to navigate public transportation from the ALF where she resides in Sarasota to the SCF campus in Bradenton. Each trip to campus required taking a bus from her home to the airport and then a second bus to campus. The return trip also required changing buses. Most impressive was that not only

was she never absent, but she was never late to class.

One of the final courses that the paralegal students complete was an internship. With her mobility and verbal communication issues, it was a challenge to find a placement for Patti. Fortunately for me, I had opened my own law office and was able to have Patti work from home and assist me with pleadings and other documents. She also prepared numerous Power Points for textbooks that we use in

During my 13 years of teaching in the SCF Legal Assisting/ Paralegal Studies program I have never met a more dedicated and determined student. I was able to talk with her while she waited in line to graduate and she shared how proud she was of meeting her goal and that she most enjoyed being with the other graduates and sharing in the excitement of graduate day.

Patti now uses a speech-generating devise that helps her communicate. She hopes to secure a part-time position with a local law firm to assist in any way possible.
